Welcome

At KHS, we put your future at the heart of everything we do. We have organised our Post 16 team with this in mind. We have a dedicated Head of Sixth Form and a separate Destinations Leader; you will also be assigned an academic mentor who will help you plan every step of your journey. Weekly meetings with your mentor replaces the system of registration followed in Year 7-11, to allow for a more intimate and bespoke experience, enabling you to experience tailored enrichment opportunities and to monitor your progress against target grades and the requirements of your next destination.

Whether you're aiming to get to a selective university or to find work we aim to make you more attractive in a competitive environment. For highly competitive ventures such as Oxbridge and other Russell Group universities and Medicine we will tailor an enrichment package that involves extra reading, attending conferences and courses and test and interview preparation. However, all students are encouraged to engage in extra-curricular activities. All students are given the opportunity to attend a mock interview experience by the Destinations Leader or their academic mentor.

- To be well informed of the range of post-school destinations available

In addition to the academic enrichment we offer a range of student-led clubs and societies. If you want to volunteer we offer a range of school-based activities. Our PALS programme (Pupil Active Listening Service) places Sixth Formers at the heart of the school acting as peer mentors to pupils making the transition to the first years of secondary school. This programme is widely recognised and you will receive external training for the role. Every department in the school has Sixth Formers running lunchtime clubs and classes.

Our students benefit from the school's excellent relationships with universities. Aberystwyth University run sessions on applying to university, personal statement writing and student life as part of our enrichment programme. We have academic links with two Oxford colleges and every year we have students enrolled on the Sutton Trust Summer Schools programme. Our students also participate in Bristol University's Access to Bristol programme. Successful completion of this guarantees an interview for courses that require one and a reduced grades offer for those that do not. We also work with the University of South Wales' Network 75 programme of degree apprenticeships if your future is to combine work and study

What do you need to know...

The Sixth Form is about preparing you for the next step - whether it be university, college or the world of work. During your time at school you will be encouraged to develop your independent learning.

When you don't have a lesson, you have **Flexitime**. This means students:

- can complete independent study in the Resource Area
- can work in the sixth form common room
- can go off site when all lessons for the day are completed


You should appreciate however that

- Non-contact time is designed for pupils to gain independence and to learn the skills of research and reading around topics you are covering.
- Flexitime enables pupils to have a broader understanding of their subject and therefore enables them to achieve a higher level of understanding.

These skills will help to develop those lifelong skills which hopefully will encourage you to be lifelong learners.

To support your child we have a system in school of academic mentors. Students will have weekly appointment to help them:

- ✓ Settle in to year 12
- ✓ Manage their time develop their organisation skills
- ✓ Monitor their progress against their targets



Second half of summer term

Please note: Year 12 students **should not** take holidays in the second half of the summer term. For A-level students we will aim to get important A2 work done in that time in order to finish A2 courses by Easter 2022. For BTEC students, Certificate work goes on throughout June, then Subsidiary Diploma work starts in July. All students will also have destination planning and Skills work to do then.

Year 13 students should not plan holidays until after 26/06. Every year, WJEC puts this statement in their timetables:

Contingency Timetable dates have been scheduled up to and including the 26th June. These dates will be used in the event of widespread, sustained national or local disruption to examinations. Centres must therefore remind candidates that they must remain available until the 26th June should an awarding body need to invoke its contingency plan.

Information that might be useful

The post school market has undergone significant changes in recent years with a range of university courses and apprentice programmes being introduced. As a sixth form we want our students to be able to navigate their way through these increasingly complicated choices.

In the current climate universities might be divided along the following lines:

- ✓ Selective universities are those who receive many more applications than they have places
- ✓ Recruiting universities are those who tend to receive fewer applications than they have places
- ✓ Private universities are those outside of the confines of student finance

All of these have minimum entry requirements based on your child's performance in their level 3 courses.

University degrees are themselves more complex than was the case in the past and the vast majority of universities will now offer some combination of the following:

- ✓ Foundation degrees these add an extra year to your child's study for those students who either fail to meet the requirement of the standard degree or those who chose the wrong subjects whilst at school
- Degrees with a placement year these give your child the opportunity to spend a year working in a field related to their degree subject
- Degrees with a year abroad these give your child the opportunity to spend a year working in a work placement abroad related to their degree subject
- ✓ Integrated masters these have a post graduate component built in at the end of the degree
- ✓ Degree apprenticeship these allow your child to earn while they learn

Selective universities

You may have read about certain categories of universities. These include:

- ✓ The Russell Group (24 most research intensive universities)
- ✓ The Sutton Trust 30

Research undertaken by the Sutton Trust found that graduates of these 30 universities:

- Earn on average £4300 (17%) more than other graduates
- 12% more likely to be in professional occupations 5 years after graduation

Apprenticeships are arguably even more complex to navigate than university courses. When your child are researching apprenticeship opportunities you need to understand that they are categorised into levels:

- ✓ Intermediate (equivalent to GCSE level). This course is aimed at those school leavers who leave Year 11 without five GCSEs A*-C including English and Maths
- ✓ Advanced (equivalent to A-Level). These are aimed at school leavers who leave Year 11 with five GCSEs at A*-C including English and Maths
- ✓ Higher (equivalent to foundation degree). These are aimed at school leavers with at least 2 A levels or equivalent qualification
- ✓ School Leaver Programmes (run by large employers e.g. KPMG). These are outside of the National Apprenticeship programme and some large employers will advertise these separately and they can be aimed at either Year 11 or Year 13 leavers
- ✓ Degree earn whilst studying and the employer pays the tuition (e.g. the University of South Wales Network 75)

Choosing a University

- ✓ Have an idea of how far from home they want to travel/live
- ✓ Disregard all of the universities outside of this range and research the rest :-
 - The Guardian University Guide is a free online tool which ranks university by institution and subject
 - Unistats.com offers additional information e.g. number of applicants to places, number of lectures per week, cost of accommodation, etc.

For more detailed information

- ✓ Visit the webpage of the university and the subject page
- ✓ Send for a prospectus (all university sites have online request forms)
- ✓ Visit the university on its open day. There is a calendar on <u>www.opendays.com</u>
- ✓ Get the most out of the open day. Visit the subject department, view the accommodation and spend some time in the city

Making choices

- ✓ Use the 3 C model to make their choice (course, campus and city). Make sure they are reasonably happy with all 3 factors
- ✓ When you apply to UCAS you can make a maximum of 5 choices (4 for Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Medicine)
- These can be 5 separate universities but they can choose more than one course from the same university

The UCAS form

The UCAS application form is completed online and is made up of several sections:

- ✓ Personal details, education and qualifications and a personal statement
- ✓ The statement is 4000 characters including spaces and should be about 60% academic (why do they want to study that subject and why they have the academic skills/aptitude for that subject) and 40% personal qualities

UCAS Track

- Once sent, your child's application moves from the UCAS Apply system to the UCAS Track system
- ✓ When they click Pay and Send, they are sending it to Mr Gilson not to UCAS
- ✓ All of their judgements will come via UCAS Track
- ✓ Make sure they read the offer letter/email that they receive from the university carefully

Types of offer

- ✓ Conditional offers (most likely) which are subject to their performance at A-Level or equivalent
- ✓ Unconditional offers (unlikely) but if they get one they are already in
- ✓ Rejections
- ✓ These offers are made via UCAS Track. Make sure they check it regularly. They will receive texts/emails when there has been a change

Conditional offers

- ✓ These mean that they have to satisfy certain conditions to be guaranteed a place
- ✓ These can be graded offers e.g. BBB
- ✓ Or points offers e.g. 120 UCAS points

✓ Point offers will take into consideration any AS subjects that they passed but did not carry on to full A-Level whereas graded offers do not

UCAS Points System

Unconditional offers

- Certain universities e.g. Aberystwyth, Bangor will offer the opportunity to sit a scholarship paper.
- ✓ If they enter and are successful, they may receive an unconditional offer. This means that regardless of their A-Level performance, they will be accepted
- ✓ Some universities make unconditional offers that can be used as either firm or insurance but these are rare

Unconditional offer schemes

- ✓ Some universities have unconditional offer schemes e.g. Birmingham, Sussex, Nottingham
- ✓ These offers are made but only under the proviso that they make that university their firm choice
- ✓ By doing so, they decline all other offers and are effectively accepted on to the course with no conditions

Five becomes two

- ✓ In most scenarios they will receive 5 conditional offers. From these, they can choose two. The deadline for this decision is May 2022 (year 13), May 2023 (Year 12)
- ✓ They choose one as your firm choice (effectively this is their first choice/favourite)
- They choose another as their insurance (this is their second choice and should offer them some security)
- \checkmark They decline the other three offers

Before they decide

- ✓ Do not let them choose their firm/insurance without further research e.g. attending the offer holders open day. This is more intimate than the general open day and will give them a better idea of the course/university
- ✓ Make sure that their insurance is a lower conditional offer than their firm. Otherwise they risk being rejected by both
- ✓ Find out whether their chosen universities offer any sort of bursaries/financial assistance

What next

- ✓ There are different deadlines for making their Firm/Insurance based on the date that they received their final offer
- ✓ Check when their two chosen universities open their applications for accommodation and apply as soon as possible. Some universities give preference to those who have selected them as their Firm choice
- ✓ Make sure they apply for a student loan via Student Finance Wales

A-Level results day

- ✓ They will receive a message on this day to confirm their place. It might be their firm, it might be their insurance
- ✓ Within one week, they will receive the formal offer in writing including any details about accommodation. "Sign" these agreements and return them as soon as possible
- ✓ If they have failed to satisfy the conditions of both offers, they will be eligible for UCAS Clearing

What if they change their mind?

- ✓ If they have an offer of a place confirmed, it is legally binding
- ✓ If their offer is from their firm choice, their insurance choice will have expired and will have probably gone into clearing
- They can put themselves into UCAS Clearing but doing so they forfeit the place they are holding
- ✓ They can put yourself into UCAS Adjustment and keep the place they are holding

UCAS Clearing

- ✓ They will be issued with a Clearing Number
- ✓ A website will exist within the UCAS site with a search function that lists all of the universities and courses that still have places available
- ✓ Make sure they act quickly and phone any of the listed universities in which they might be interested as soon as possible. Be sure to have their UCAS ID & clearing number handy as it will allow the universities to make them an offer more quickly. They do not have to have applied to these universities as one of their original five

The Clearing Process

- ✓ Initially, they will speak to one of the university's clearing team who will transfer them to the admissions team
- ✓ If they made you an nominee on the application you will be permitted to talk to the university on their behalf
- The conversation with admissions can take the form of a mini-interview (remember to ask for accommodation)
- ✓ They will make them an offer
- ✓ They can then add this as a Clearing choice* in UCAS Track (usually from 3pm and the university will respond to confirm their place)
- ✓ They can get several offers over the phone but can only add one as a choice

UCAS Adjustment

- ✓ If they did better than expected and now decide they want to go to a "better" university or enrol on a different course then they can register for Adjustment on UCAS Track
- ✓ Once registered, they will have 5 24 hour sessions (including weekends) to find a suitable course and university. Check what is available on Clearing but also contact the universities directly
- ✓ They will keep their confirmed place while they are looking for others so if they find an alternative they will have to contact the university that holds their confirmed place to be released. Make sure they do not do this until they have an agreement from the alternative. At the end of the five days, UCAS Track reverts to their original offer


Student Finance

- \checkmark Think of this as a graduate tax rather than a loan
- ✓ The student borrows a tuition fee loan and a maintenance loan
- ✓ Repayments only begin when earnings are greater than £25k and they repay 9% p.a of their earnings above that threshold
- ✓ So someone earning £26k would repay £90 pa (less than £8 per month)
- ✓ The debt is written off after 30 years
- ✓ Full amount of tuition varies (capped at £9000 in Wales and £9250 in the rest of UK)
- ✓ Grants for maintenance will still be available to all Welsh students (£1000 non-means tested) so every student will receive at least £1000 as a non-repayable grant
- ✓ There is a sliding scale to calculate the size of the grant based on household income with a maximum grant of £9000
- ✓ All students will have £9000 for maintenance (part grant and part loan). There is no parental contribution in Student Finance Wales (unlike in England)

Unifrog

- Unifrog is a one-stop-shop where students can easily explore their interests, then find and successfully apply for their next best step after school.
- Unifrog will help you to explore your key interests and what career paths you can take to reach your goals
- In Unifrog there are a number of excellent resources and tools as shown on the next page. These will help you plan your future destinations.

Education maintenance Allowance (EMA)

Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) is a weekly payment of £40 to help 16-18 year olds with the costs of further education. Payments are made every 2 weeks as long as you meet the school's attendance, performance and behaviour requirements.

EMA is dependent on household income and a link to EMA Wales can be found at

www.studentfinancewales.co.uk

Application forms are available from the school in the Sixth Form Resource Area or from Student Finance Wales. The application form should be returned as soon as possible at the beginning of the year. If it is not received within 8 weeks of starting your course you may lose out on back-dated payments.

If students are entitled to EMA they will be notified by Student Finance Wales. Payments are made fortnightly directly into the student's personal bank account.

Students must complete an EMA Learning Agreement with the school which sets out the conditions they need to meet in order to qualify for payment.

The award of EMA is regulated by the Welsh Assembly Government, the school simply administers the system by monitoring attendance and targets and by passing this information on to the WAG

Any initial queries, however, may be addressed to the Post 16 Wellbeing and Learning Support Officer who is based in the Sixth Form Resource Area.
